

POLICE HOME IS DEDICATED

Cary Praises Lodge's Decision to Honor Carlson.

Members of Red Rose lodge, No. 16, Fraternal Order of Police, dedicated their new home to Commissioner of Police Albert Carlson at special ceremonies yesterday.

The dedicatory address was made by Mayor D. E. Cary, who told the 100 members and guests that it was appropriate to honor a man who has done much for the department and the city. He complimented the police on their unity, declaring this was necessary for greatest efficiency.

Added training is necessary for the police of today because the criminals they combat are more clever than those of 25 years ago, the Mayor said. He also praised the pistol team for its high standing in recent tournaments. Commissioner Carlson made a brief response.

The home is located about a half-mile north of the Lincoln Highway west of Mountville. It consists of a large house and a smaller one-room structure, newly erected. An outdoor fireplace has been added.

Flag Raised

The flag raising ceremony was in charge of Lieutenant Amos Shultz, vice-commander of Post 34, American Legion, and a call to the colors was sounded by four buglers from the post drum corps. A minute of silence was observed in memory of deceased members of the force. A prayer was offered by City Commissioner Daniel W. Coulter.

The ceremonies were held in conjunction with the annual summer outing of the lodge. The outing started yesterday morning and continued until late last night in order that all policemen could attend. The committee in charge of the outing included: Sergeant Ray Charles, chairman; Policemen Earl Labezius, Harry Brenner, John Kippborn, and Elwood Rutter.

The new home was remodeled by members of the lodge, working under the direction of the home committee. This committee includes Lieutenant R. J. Kamm, Sergeant Albert Montgomery and Policemen William Jenkins and Charles Resh.

Other guests of honor attending the dedication were City Commissioners Donald M. Mylin and Daniel W. Coulter, City Solicitor Bernard M. Zimmerman, City Controller M. J. Mc Nerney, District Attorney K. L. Shirk, Fire Chief Harry Miller and Corporal John A. Aumon, of the State Motor Police.
